An Introduction to the "Catholic" Faith

Introductory Remarks

Perhaps, when you saw that headline above, you may have thought to yourself, "Has the Pastor lost his marbles?" (Well, I will admit, that's certainly a possibility!).

Then, perhaps you thought to yourself, "Aren't we Lutherans?" Well, yes, indeed, we are. But I submit to you that we are also "catholic" Christians ("catholic" with a small "c").

Sunday by Sunday, we affirm our belief in the "catholic" Church, as in the words of the Apostles' Creed, which says "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church...."

So, read on, if you will, as we explore our faith as "catholic" Christians together.

The Origin of the Word "Catholic"

The word itself comes from the Greek, where two words combined with one another meant "according to the whole", meaning the agreed-upon consensus of belief and order.

Then, from Greek, the word made its way into Latin (this shouldn't be a surprise: Many words made such a journey). From Latin, the word found its way into English.

The Various Uses and Meanings of the Word

The word "catholic" itself has now come to mean "universal". This is in keeping with its original meaning in Greek, for it conveys the idea that the consensus in matters of faith and morals of faithful Christians is spread across many expressions of the Christian faith.

So it is that the word is used in a number of different ways, each with a distinctive meaning.

When referring to the Roman Catholic Church: When written with a capital (upper case) "C", the word most often refers to the Roman Catholic Church. So when someone says, "I am a Catholic", they usually mean that they are a member of the Roman Catholic Church.

Perhaps most people, whether or not they know anything about the Christian faith, or about the Church, would recognize this use of the term.



When referring to the early Church's foundational years: Here another use of the word "catholic" (usually written with a lower case, small "c") emerges. It refers to the first five centuries of the Church's existence, that period of time when the Church hammered out its core beliefs, often in the midst of persecutions from without and challenges to accepted belief from within.

The Reformers in the sixteenth century were keenly aware of this period of the Church's life.

When referring to a body of different churches which share a common order and aspects of worship: Here the word would refer to a grouping of churches which we might call "liturgical" churches. These churches value the shape of worship which emerged in the early centuries cited above. Churches in this group of "catholic" churches would include the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican/Episcopal Churches, Lutheran Churches, and the Eastern Orthodox Churches. (This list isn't intended to be comprehensive...there are other bodies which could be included.)

It's worth noting that, although this grouping of "catholic" Churches share some aspects of their worship together, there are differences between them, as well.

When referring to Christians who share common beliefs: Here we return to the foundational meaning of the word, meaning "universal". We can say that Christians of whatever expression who hold to the essentials of the faith and to its historical moral teachings are "catholic" Christians.

Such essentials of belief might include the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed, whether or not some Christians would make use of those statements of faith.

One Final Thought: Christians Can Be Grouped Into More Than One Category

Perhaps it will be obvious that Christians can be properly called "catholic" Christians because they could be categorized one of the classifications given above. But, they could be "catholic" because they fit into more than one of the definitions given above. So, for example, we Lutherans could be classified as being "catholic" because we are members of a Church which values liturgy, but also because we adhere to the received truths of the faith as they were formulated in the early centuries of the Church's existence.

Next month, we'll explore "catholic" worship and liturgy.





In last month's newsletter, we began exploring the beautiful stained glass windows installed in 1949 by the Rudy Glass Company of York, PA. This month, we'll continue our journey, focusing on the remaining windows that enrich our church with their vibrant artistry and profound symbolism.

As you stand before the altar, you'll notice two significant smaller windows. To the right, a window beautifully illustrates the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, a powerful reminder of our initiation into the Christian faith. On the left, another window features a striking frontal view of Flohrs Lutheran Church, accompanied by the psalmist's inviting words, beckoning all to worship.

Moving to the landings within the church, you'll find more thematic depth. The window on the left landing powerfully depicts God's justice and righteousness in His dealings with humanity, a testament to divine order and fairness. Across from it, on the right landing, the window showcases the providence of God for people in all corners of the earth, a comforting symbol of His unending care and provision for all creation.

Finally, the first-floor rooms also received their stained glass adornments at the same time as those in the nave. These windows share a uniform design, each featuring a single, profound symbolic representation. As you view them, you'll discover a rich tapestry of Christian themes. The windows on each side of the wall depict: the Holy Spirit, Jesus the Prince of Peace, the Victorious Lamb seated on a book with seven seals, the Lord as the Light of the World, the Sacrament of Holy Communion, Peace, the Passion of Christ, and the Resurrection. Each window serves as a visual sermon, inviting contemplation and deepening our understanding of our faith.

These windows are more than just beautiful decorations; they are an integral part of Flohrs Lutheran Church's history and spiritual fabric, continuing to inspire and uplift all who gather here.
