"CATHOLIC" WORSHIP (PART ONE)

Introduction

In last month's column, I wrote about the "catholic" faith. At that time, I said that, perhaps, many of you were questioning the use of the word "catholic" (even to the point – maybe – of asking of the Pastor had lost his marbles), since we are Lutherans.

Last month's column offered some definitions of the word, which means "universal". Lutheran Christians can rightfully claim to be "universal" in their understanding of the Christian faith. Lutherans can also rightfully claim to be "catholic" Christians, for our worship reflects the practices of the early Church in its formative years.

In this month's column, we will base our considerations of what constitutes "catholic" worship on the definition of the beliefs and the worship patterns that emerged in the early Church, and especially in the first five centuries of its life. As such, this period, then, predates the formation of what we now normally think of in the context of the use of the word "catholic". (Recall that, last month, we said that when the word is spelled with a capital "C", it usually refers to the Roman Catholic Church. When used with a small "c", it often refers to the use of the word as it means "universal".)

It's important for us to remember that the Reformers of the sixteenth-century, Martin Luther among them, were keenly aware of the early Church's worship practices. One of the things that Luther did was to rid the Church of the additions to the early Church's worship that had crept in over the centuries. His reforms, which simplified worship, resonated far and wide in other Christian bodies (the Church of England is one example of a Christian group that was deeply impressed with Luther's work).

Origins of "catholic" Worship

We don't know a whole lot about how the very early Church worshipped.

We do know that the celebration of the Holy Communion was central to their gatherings. But we don't know a lot about the actual texts that were used. (The actual words of worship are known as the "Rite".)

It's probably a safe assumption to say that the early Church had established patterns in their worship. After all, as the Christian faith emerged from Jewish worship, it probably had a structure that we could call "liturgical", for Temple worship in Jerusalem was liturgical. (Remember that the word "liturgy" means "work of the people". Liturgy often refers to established patterns of worship.)

One early source which has been beneficial is the Liturgy of Hippolytus (c.160 - c.235 AD), which was influential in shaping worship practices which followed.

Ponderings of The Pastor Continued

As time went along, variations in the Church's worship were bound to appear. So, today, we can say that various Christian bodies have differences in their worship styles. But, for those bodies whose background is "catholic", there are some commonalities.

To these commonly-used elements, we will now turn.

The Gathering Space - the Church Building

Churches which value their "catholic" heritage often have buildings whose design and purpose are meant to steer our attention to God's holiness, majesty and glory. (To be honest, as newer church buildings are being constructed, they often exhibit less of the distinctive characteristics of older buildings as being "catholic" in their nature.)

Church architecture that is often associated with "catholic" worship is often either Gothic or Romanesque. (This is often more-true of older buildings than with newer ones.)

Stained glass often portrays various chapters in Jesus' life and ministry, or perhaps heroes of the faith, or other similar subjects.

The *altar* is the focal point of the sacred space, for it is there that the Holy Communion (Eucharist) is celebrated.

A divided chancel is often used, with a lectern on the right-hand side (looking forward) and a pulpit on the left.

The presence light reminds us of God's abiding presence in the sacred space.

Candles remind us of the light of Christ.

Other Elements of "catholic" Worship

Other elements of liturgical worship can be found in various Christian groups and traditions. Among them are:

The Church Year, which is built around two major festivals, Christmas and Easter. In addition to the season of the year, the Church Year also offers saints' days and holy days.

Liturgical colors which change throughout the year. The principal colors are: Violet (or blue in Advent), White, Green and Red.

Use of *vestments*, which identify the roles that various persons fulfill in worship. Many vestments trace their origins to clothing worn by Roman civil authorities (like the chasuble, on over garment which is draped over the shoulders). Others, like the alb (the white, ankle-length garment), come to us from early Church's baptismal practices, where newly-baptized persons were clothed in a white garment.

Using our bodies as worship instruments is common to "catholic" worship, So, for example, we sit, stand and kneel (in some places). We sing, we recite responses or prayers. In some places, incense is used (representing the rising of our prayers to God).

Next month, we'll examine how liturgical worship has changed over time.

Family History and Flohr's Church Submitted by

With our 240th anniversary approaching, we thought it would be interesting if members could track their family histories of membership at Flohr's Church.

This is from Sue McCleaf Nespeca, Bill Bucher and Joan Bucher Reeve.

Sue's Mom, Elizabeth Bucher McCleaf, was a member all of her 103 years of life, from her birth in 1914.

Her brother, Crowell, Bill and Joan's Dad, attended all 97 years of his life, from his birth in 1915.


Elizabeth and Crowell's father, Samuel Gilbert Bucher, was a member for all 83 years of his life, from his birth in 1867.

Prior to that, his mother, Anna Crowl Bucher, was a member for many years, and longer than 1867, because Samuel Gilbert was her youngest son, and all her daughters born before him were also members of Flohr's.

She was born in 1820, and quite possibly might have been a member her entire life, but we do not have proof of that. Membership records at Flohr's Church, prior to the Civil War, were believed to have been burnt by the Confederate soldiers to start campfires while they slept in the area around the church. This has been reported in several sources.

We also do not know if any of her relatives were members of the church prior to 1820. So, we know our family has been members of the church longer than 1867, and possibly since 1820, up to the present day.

We would be interested in hearing about other members' family church history.



Learning Center Classroom Clean-Out & Pre-Sale!




