"THE LAST IN OUR SERIES: 'CATHOLIC' WORSHIP" Introduction

This month, we'll wrap up our look back into history, and particularly, to that part of the Church's history as it has come to us from the first five centuries of its existence, to see how the gifts and practices of that time in the Church's life have come to us today.

So, this is, indeed, a look at the "catholic" Church, that is to say, it is to look at a time in the Church's common life when the Church was united and undivided. So, the Church was, truly, "universal" (which is the essential meaning of the word "catholic").

This month, we'll look at several aspects of the Church's "catholic" worship, its liturgy.

Worship: Upbeat and Celebratory - or - Penitential in its Flavor?

Perhaps a good place to start with, as we think about worship in general, is to ask, "Should the Church's worship be upbeat and a cause for celebration? Or should the Church's worship focus on our unworthiness as a fallen people, who are on our knees, asking God for mercy and forgiveness?

Into this question, the deliberations of the Second Vatican Council (which met from 1962 – 1966) can provide an answer. It is true that the Council was a meeting of Roman Catholic Church leaders. But it was a radical departure from past practice, in that Christians from many non-Roman Catholic communities were also invited as observers. (Could it be that the winds of the Holy Spirit were/are blowing through the Church, ushering in a new, more cooperative spirit among the various parts of the Christian community? I'd like to think so.)

The Council ushered in a major shift in the tone of worship, stating that the Church had lost sight of the fact that every Sunday worship event is a celebration of our Lord's resurrection. Therefore, each Sunday should, in some way, reflect joy. It should be a celebration. Now, it's true that more somber seasons of the Church Year lead us to more penitential times. (Lent is a good example.) But, overall, the Council's decision was that the tone of worship should change.

Those non-Roman Catholic observers to the Council were paying attention. And so, in many Christian communities outside the Roman Church, worship took on a more upbeat and positive tone. (If you have old Lutheran service books, take a look at the change in tone in their worship materials.) The change in focus ushered in some changes in how liturgical worship is conducted. Among them were:

West-facing celebration: (Explanatory note: Where the altar is located within a church building, no matter which direction it actually faces, is the "liturgical east".) With the changes that came about, the Pastor or Priest (or Bishop) who led worship during the celebration of Holy Communion now stood facing west, facing the congregation. This meant that altars that were up against the wall had to be moved out. (This wasn't possible in every church building.) The change means this: When the worship leader faced the altar, with their back to the congregation, the symbolism was that that person was standing between an angry God and God's people. Now, as worship leaders faced the people, they became one with the worshippers, a part of the entire Christian community.

Ponderings of The Pastor Continued

Frequency of Holy Communion: A change that took place among non-Roman Catholics was the realization (long a practice in the Roman Church) that Holy Communion/Holy Eucharist/Mass should be the primary worship service on a Sunday. Previous to this, many Christians celebrated Communion much less frequently. Many traditions who had a Morning Prayer service on most Sundays, set those aside, in order to celebrate the Communion more frequently.

The roles of lay persons: The Council realized that worship had become far too "clergy-focused". In many traditions, ordained persons did everything: They led worship, they read the lessons, they administered both elements of Communion. Lay people were (largely) observers. Vatican II changed that, saying that the worshipping community ought to reflect the makeup of the Christian community, a community that is made up of four Orders: Lay persons, Bishops, Pastors/Priests, and Deacons. (By the way, lay persons are the first Order, not the last.) So, after the Council, lay persons took up a much more active role in worship, as they do today.

<u>Varying Understandings of the Nature of the Holy Communion</u>

Christians generally regard the nature of Communion in three ways:

Roman Catholic: Transubstantiation, or the understanding that, in the eucharistic celebration, the communion elements of bread and wine undergo a change in their substance, into the Lord's actual Body and Blood, even though our outward senses cannot discern the change in substance.

Lutheran and Anglican (Episcopal): A slightly different understanding is found here. The communion elements do not change during the celebration, but as the elements are consecrated (blessed) by the presider, the Lord is present in the elements, under/around/through/within, etc.

Protestant: The Communion celebration is a memorial, and nothing more than that.

The Building Blocks of the Communion Service

Down through time, a general pattern has evolved in the Communion liturgy.

There are five basic parts of it. (Some parts can be omitted.) Here they are (along with their traditional Greek/Latin titles)

Lord, have mercy (Kyrie)
Glory to God (Gloria)
Creeds (Nicene, Apostles', Athanasian)
Holy, Holy, Holy/Blessed is he (Sanctus/Benedictus)
Lamb of God (Agnus Dei)

Conclusion

One of the goals of this series is to allow us to see that much of our worship comes to us from ancient times.

Another goal is to remind us that our worship shares with many other Christians common elements that all point to a common heritage. Indeed, I think it's fair to say that most Christians worship in some sort of a liturgical way, a way that has its roots in the first five centuries of the Church's life, that "catholic" time of universal witness to our Lord Jesus Christ.

Hope you've enjoyed reading. Hope you've benefitted from doing so.




